Our band didn't have a name as I




recall, and we broke up, not because of John Lennon's girlfriend, but because our drummer moved away, and our guitarist lost interest

Food and adult drinks will be available through King's Korner with the proceeds going to the Chesterfield Twinning Association, which is a project of the Chester Community Association.




