Help Chesterfield County win \$20K during "Meet Me at the Park"

Chesterfield County Parks and Recreation is asking residents to help the department win \$20,000 to improve one of its county parks by nominating them in a nationwide contest.

During April, in recognition of Earth Month and Earth Day the National Recreation and Park Association, NRPA, is collaborating with The Walt Disney Company, including Disney Citizenship, Disney/ABC Television Groups and ESPN, to revitalize parks across the U.S. for a third year. The parks and recreation department that receives the most nominations will receive a \$20,000 grant to improve a local park.

From April 1-30, Chesterfield County residents will have the opportunity to nominate the county for the \$20,000 grant, which could fund substantial improvements to one of our county parks. Park supporters can nominate the county

by visiting www.meetmeatthepark.org. In addition, everyone who submits a nomination will be entered in a drawing for a tablet completely outfitted for the outdoors.

Parks make the county a better place to live and contribute to the quality of life. They are essential to the county's health and well-being. They provide safe places to be active and enjoy nature, help preserve the environment, and bring people together. Dr. James Worsley, Chesterfield County Parks and Recreation director, is excited about the prospect of competing for the grant.

"Chesterfield County is fortunate to have a diverse and engaging park system," Worsley said. "We hope residents will show their support for additional funding for our parks by nominating Chesterfield County. I know everyone would like to bring that funding home and make a big difference in one of our parks."

During April, a public service announcement supporting the Meet Me at the Park campaign will be shared with audiences across Disney, including the ABC television network its affiliate stations, Freeform, Disney Channel, Disney XD, Disney Junior, and the ABC app and other digital platforms. The PSA also will be available to view on the voting site at www.nrpa.org/beinspired. Radio Disney also will support the campaign with an on-air radio spot.

"Supporting local parks is essential to the health and vitality of communities everywhere," said Lori Robertson, NRPA Director of Conservation. "That's why we are proud to collaborate with The Walt Disney Company to help fund critical park improvement projects. We encourage everyone to join us in giving back to the places that shape so much of our lives by

voting in this year's Meet Me at the Park campaign."

In 2016, Chesterfield County parks had nearly 6,000,000 visitors. Department recreation staff offered more than 1,000 programs to 203,000 individuals in the county.
